"It is surprising how many girls don't even ask if you have protection and are happy to just get down to business," Kenny says.

As a result, backpackers are taking home, and leaving behind, some unpleasant reminders of their sexual prowess.

Lynne says the high number of heterosexual backpackers coming to the clinic with new sexually transmitted infections, including HIV, is directly linked to the backpacking culture.

A fact backed up by research conducted by Slide premium condoms, which shows STIs like Chlamydia have quadrupled in the past decade for those aged under 29.

"Most backpackers are aged in their 20s," says Slide brand manager David Madigan.

"And three quarters of all reported STIs in Australia are from people aged between 15 and 29, so backpackers clearly make up a large part of this demographic."

In response to this trend, sexual health groups, local councils and backpacker associations and hostels are joining forces to promote better sexual health practices among young international travelers.

Sydney's Safe in the Sack project pushes messages like, "I came for a trip of a lifetime, now I'm leaving with a lifetime infection."

Queensland Health has also launched its "Sex, Drugs and Backpackers" initiative.

Slide will be offering free condoms to backpacker hostels in line with other initiatives designed to increase their usage.

"Our mission is to make condoms fashionable again," says David.

"We all know sex is fun, we just want to make sure people do it safely."

So what is it about traveling the world that makes backpackers put their health at risk?

"I think people do think about STIs, but it is usually the next day," says Kenny.
